Diane Patterson was co-opted on by the Council at its October meeting. Congratulations and welcome Diane.


As you may not be aware all our meetings whether Full or Committee are all back to being held in the Annexe at the Community Centre and residents who want to are most welcome to join us at any meetings.

Dogs on the Millennium Green - helpful advice

On lead etiquette



When walking your dog on lead, be mindful of how they interact with other dogs. The restriction of being on a lead can make your dog react in a very different way than they would if they were off-lead in the same situation.

For instance, when dogs approach each other on-lead, they have to meet each other

head-to-head which may cause some dogs to become more worried/ frustrated than they would usually be.

It may help to give your dog plenty of space to pass other dogs so that they aren't forced into greeting a dog that they don't want to. Bear in mind that if your dog is onlead, then they may become frustrated with an off-lead dog approaching them as they may feel too restricted.

Off lead etiquette

Only let your dog off lead if it has good recall training in place and you are always in control and nearby. Top tips to help make sure both your dog and other dogs have the best time off the lead.

Don't allow your dog to approach young children - many often do not know how to interact with dogs yet or get knocked over by dogs rushing at them to be greeted.

Keep your pooch away from other leashed dogs. Owners will keep their dog on lead for various reasons such as training, reactive behaviour towards other dogs or people, nervousness or health reasons (including if their dog is post-surgery and is on strict gentle walks).

Be sure to keep a close eye on your dog at all times – they may wander our of reach or get distracted by the other dogs

It's important to monitor dogs playing in a group environment because things can quickly escalate, especially when a new dog is introduced to the group.

Some Seasonal safety tips

Autumn: A beautiful time of year with an array of colours adorning the trees. But while you're looking up at the various shades of reds, browns and vellows, be sure to look down at the floor and watch out for conkers. Conkers can cause serious health risk to your pet if ingested.



Spring: This is the perfect time of year to spot spring flowers blooming in the wild. However, flowers such as daffodils are poisonous to dogs if they eat the bulbs or flowers, so try to keep your dog away from these where possible.



Winter: Wintertime can be lots of fun for all the family but make sure you're prepared for the hazards for dogs that come with it. Snow can cause confusion when it's blanketed over a frozen lake or pond. Be sure to keep your dog on lead if vou're in unfamiliar territory on a snowy day.



Summer: When the summer heat kicks in, we need to remember to keep our pets cool as dogs can very quickly become overheated and dehydrated when out walking. Be prepared and bring water with you on walks for your dog and keep them out of waters which may not be clean, or take them in the shade for parts of your walk.


Councillor Profile - Vyn Thornhill

I am a Preston lad, although I have lived in both Leyland & Grimsargh, and now I am proudly part of the greater Euxton Buckshaw community.

retirement with walking, family genealogy and spending time with our family & grandsons. Much to Yvonne's pleasure I'm a keen cook and often take 'the helm' in the kitchen. I also have a canoe on which I take to the water from time to time.

The first time I was co-opted onto the Euxton Parish Council I was given a "Good Councillor Guide" as part of my induction pack. There was one paragraph within the book that I will remember... "you are now part of the democratic framework of the country representing your community"... As the first tier of local government parish councils are uniquely placed to represent and contribute to our local community. When one

Washington Hall, Euxton

During the recent G7 Speakers Conference in Chorley, I had the great honour of meeting Nancy Pelosi, Speaker of the US House of Representatives, and was at a special ceremony when she presented St. Laurence's Church in Chorley with a new flag.

The new stars and stripes flew during President Biden's inauguration in January of this year.

It is now destined to appear alongside an older flag which was presented to the church nearly 80 years ago. But how did that first flag arrive in Chorley?

Although it was estimated that accommodation would be required for about 400 munition workers at the nearby ROF (Royal Ordnance Factory) Chorley, and provisions made accordingly, it was soon discovered that a residential centre in Euxton (third to Highways and Woodlands) would not be required for such a purpose, due to the availability of a large workforce already living in the local area. The site, located off what was then German Lane, was used for a short while as a feeding and amenities centre instead.

From 5th August 1942 it was taken over by the 127th Reinforcement Battalion of the United States Air Force, who further developed the buildings to suit their particular needs, adding a cinema, hospital block, baseball pitch, to name but a few.

It was during this time that the establishment was given the name Washington Hall. The lane leading to the site was at that time called German Lane, which was quickly changed to Washington Lane following a motion brought by Euxton Parish Council.

The troops were very popular in the area (particularly with the children) for their generosity in giving away chocolates and sweets. Crowds would often gather to watch them play their unfamiliar baseball games held in Astley Park; Washington Hall Yankies Vs Washington Hall Cubs.

On VE Day 1945, the Americans celebrated the end of hostilities with massive bonfires throughout the Washington Hall estate; burning amongst other things, their administration office furniture!

The Americans left on 10th October 1945 but not before a farewell party with buffet dinner and dancing, with around 350 US Forces staff, wives and friends was held at Washington Hall.

The troops were well aware of the close relationship between America and Chorley, for St. Laurence's Church was the place of worship for the Standish family. In 1620, Myles Standish sailed to America on the Mayflower as Military Advisor to the Pilgrim Fathers and later established the settlement of Duxbury, Massachusetts.

The Americans were allowed to hold their 1942 Thanksgiving Service in St. Laurence's Church, and for many Americans it would be their first away from home. Poignantly, Myles Standish was of course in America for the first Thanksgiving. As a sign of their appreciation for how welcome they had been made to feel, the Americans gifted the Church their "Stars & Stripes" - the American flag. The flag is still there to this day and hangs above the famous Standish Pew.

And now it has the new flag as company. As a symbolic gesture of continued friendship between the two countries, Speaker Pelosi handed over the new flag in a beautiful presentation case to Fr Neil Kelley, Rector of St Laurence's, at a very special ceremony.

Another wartime "Stars & Stripes" remains at Washington Hall and is on display in a large frame at the Fire Training Centre.

Although it wasn't possible for the G7 Speakers contingent to visit Euxton, it was great being able to share stories with them all about little Euxton, making a huge contribution to the war effort; not only hosting over 50,000 American service personnel during a three year period, but also playing its part in the story of the ROF, once one of the largest munitions filling factory in the world!

Euxton Walks

Euxton has a large number of public rights of way for you to walk and enjoy the village from all angles.

45 specific paths are described and mapped on the Council's 'Walkers Guide to Euxton'.

Pick one up at Euxton Library. Map display boards are at the Library, Union Place BV, Brookwood Way BV, and at the Skate Park Southport Road.





The Last Post is played for Dennis Earlam

Who passed away on the 7th October 2021.

A wreath will be laid for him at the Bomber Command Memorial in Green Park, which London, in he campaigned, on Remembrance weekend.

The Euxton WEB featured Dennis receiving The Legion of Honour, the highest French order of merit for military and civil merits back in Issue 84 March 2021, also a snapshot of Dennis's WW2 history in Issue 80 of March 2020 - these can be viewed in the 'newsletter' section of the Council's website.

Extract from artical of March 2020

Dennis Earlam was a proud member of 578 RAF Bomber command in the 2nd World War.

Like many of his generation, he lied about his age, to do their bit for their country, and volunteered at the age of 17yr. He said they were known as the Brylcreem boys.

He was a rear gunner on the Halifax bombers, and at the age of 21 held rank of warrant officer...




