#### **Remembrance Reminders**

Three years ago Cllr Aidy Riggott asked the Council if it could put up large poppies on lamp posts through the village as a visible reminder for people leading up to Remembrance Sunday. More poppies have been bought for new locations.

This year they have been affixed to two more major junctions, the Bay Horse crossroads and junction of Balshaw Lane and Wigan Road, also outside the War Memorial Club as well as the junction with School Lane where the Euxton War Memorial monument stands.

# **Allotments for Euxton - update**

Following the articles in the last two newsletters, we just wanted update that this project is progressing and we repeated the process waiting list below for those interested.



On site works have been carried out such investigation works and tree trimming, next is to check and maintain the drainage ditches.

Waiting list process

To get on the Allotment Waiting List you need to fill out an 'Expression of Interest' form. Fill and return the form to Euxton Council before the end of the year (31st December 2019). The form will be available on the Council's website under 'Documents | Others' or email to request one be sent back to you.

- + If you are an Euxton resident and you are already on the Chorley Council allotment waiting list (prior to 1st June 2019) you will be contacted separately but, if you still want to fill in an expression of interest and answer the questions your name will be linked with that place.
- + If you are an Euxton resident and not on any waiting lists and do not have a plot on another site in Chorley and wish to go on the Euxton waiting list - then you will need to get an 'Expression of Interest' form, fill and return it to Euxton Council before the end of the year (31st December 2019).
- + If you are an Euxton resident and already have an allotment plot somewhere in Chorley, you will have been contacted by Chorley to ask if you may wish to re-locate to a plot in Euxton. Euxton Council will have your details already, but if you want to fill out a form that is ok, you will be linked back.

## A Millennium Green year

The pond's second summer is over and, thank goodness, was a much more sympathetic one than 2018. When the pond, the staging, the tree planting, wildflower seeding and planting were completed by our contractors, Lancashire Wildlife Trust, in late spring 2018. The weather started on a long, hot, dry spell that lasted through the summer. The pond was never more than half full and many trees and plants died. The Parish Council resorted to watering the young trees by hand and eventually rented a water bowser to make the task easier. Our thanks to any users of the Green who took a turn at watering the trees from the bowser. The efforts were successful and enough trees survived although the Council will watch their progress and, if necessary, supplement the tree planting in Few of the wildflower plants made an appearance last year. The most successful was a tough and ugly pink flowered plant, redshank, which was not planted on purpose but which took advantage of the bare ground to invade and occupy the site.

So much for the pond surroundings, but the pond itself did little to raise the spirits. It has a bentonite liner with about 300mm of excavated material replaced on top (to protect it and to provide a base for plants and creatures in the pond). Unfortunately, the material was mainly a very fine and colourful clay which has been slow to settle. Google Earth at present shows the pond as it was in summer 2018 - a sort of pale orange colour. It wasn't helped by the number of dogs that enjoyed a dip, but churned up the bottom of the pond. Eventually, the Parish Council had to resort to putting up notices asking owners to keep their dogs out of the pond. All told, 2018 was rather disappointing.

2019 has been much better. The pond has gradually filled up - but only during this wet October has it finally reached its full depth and size. The water colour is slowly but surely fading as the clay settles and as the water-based plants start to stabilise the bottom of the pond. The small trees have got themselves established and are starting to grow. The redshank has had its day and disappeared. Some of the planted wildflowers, in and around the pond, survived the 2018 drought and have also got themselves established indeed the Council's challenge in future might be too much plant life in the pond, not too little. Some plants have been especially impressive - the purple loosestrife, both in and around the pond, gave a spectacular and long-lasting display. There may be some need for future management to assist the plants that are wanted and to discourage those that aren't, or it might be better just to let nature take its course from now on. As the 'natural' area around



the pond becomes better established it will become more difficult for dogs to enter the pond.

The pond is also attracting wildlife. Frogs have been seen - there was a small amount of frogspawn early in the year. Creatures like pond snails, whirligig beetles, backswimmers and pond skaters have found their way in and dragonflies (I saw three different species of dragonfly in a single day) were present and were laying eggs on pond vegetation. Mallard ducks have paid fleeting visits and black headed gulls more frequent ones. (And what is the bird that regularly marks its visit by the residue it leaves on the handrail of the pond staging?)

The staging now boasts a splendid information board provided designed by Mr Andrew Grey, Curator of Herpetology at the Manchester Museum.

We look forward to 2020 and a bigger 'crop' of frogspawn, perhaps visits from toads or newts, to a still clearing pond with a more natural fit into the surrounding Green. If you haven't been to the Green, recently or at all, the Council would recommend it to you. It is a beautiful and restful green space, made more interesting by the pond and new paths, and shows a totally different side of Euxton to that on the other side of the busy and bustling Wigan Road.

#### **Councillor Vacancy in Euxton North West**



A vacancy for a Parish Councillor has arisen on the Council in Euxton North West, following a resignation. There has been no call for an election so the vacancy can be filled by cooption.

Applications are invited and any person wishing to serve as a Councillor should write to the Clerk giving details of interests, experience and reasons for wishing to serve.

To qualify, a person must be a British subject or citizen of the Irish Republic, over 18 years of age and an elector, must reside within the parish of Euxton, or within 3 miles of it, or occupy as owner or tenant any land or premises therein, or have their principal or only place of work there, and must not be disqualified from holding office as a Councillor (details from the Clerk).

Closing date for the receipt of applications is 6th January 2020, co-opting will take place at the 16th January 2020 meeting.

Further details of eligibility, procedures of a vacancy, guidance of being a Parish Councillor for Euxton are all available on request from the Clerk or linked on the Council's website to the vacancy notice.



Back in August, the long running project to install our Wicker Cannon on the roundabout near to Buckshaw Hall finally came to a close.



The plants chosen to be around the outside are, fern in various colours, heathers in three colours and poppy plants in two varieties which should flower at different times of the year.

# Obstructions and pavements - follow ups

We introduced this initiative in the last newsletter and have some positive responses from residents and partnership agencies.

Many residents have sent in reports of blockages such as overgrown hedges etc and these have been reported on to the correct people, not all get solved immediately and some do take time to encourage residents to trim up trees, bushes and hedges.

Lancashire County Council has agreed to line-paint some no parking areas next to some dropped kerbs on Cotswold Avenue to allow prams, wheelchairs, cycles etc. to use the dropped kerbs, as they were often parked over.

Chorley Council has confirmed that, in negotiating its new household bin collection contract, the issue of bins being put back where they were found was one of its specific criteria and Chorley Council confirms:

The Councils waste contractor FCC are required to return bins to their collection point once emptied i.e. the same position as the bin is presented for collection.

As you know we operate a kerbside collection service for residents. However, we are aware of some locations where there is no obvious kerbside, so bins are presented in other locations to avoid obstruction.

There is a specific performance target in the waste collection contract that relates to complaints received in relation to bins not being returned to their collection point.

If you can advise of any specific locations where this a problem, I am happy to investigate further.

So if you have trouble with the issue mentioned above, take some photos and either report to Chorley or through the Clerk.

Some simple but effective ways YOU can help:

Think carefully when putting the bins out for collection - push to the wall, tuck out of the way or on your drive if you can - take a look at how you have placed them and if they are an obstruction?

Do not park over dropped kerbs - these are for wheelchair or pushchair users to safely cross roads and side road - Don't be the obstruction to safe crossing.

Do not park too far on a pavement that no one can pass on the pavement beside your vehicle.

If you see an obstruction of any nature, whether it is a sign, a post or anything - take a quick photo and email it and the location to clerk@euxtoncouncil.org.uk and we can report it and try to tidy up our pavements.

# Christmas Decorations & Fire Safety by Councillor Dez Rigg

Christmas is coming and the decorations are coming out of the box. The real Xmas tree is purchased from the seasonal stalls that spring-up at garden centres. The tinsel is festooned anywhere there is a hook! Electric lights are removed from the packaging they were bundled into 11 months ago and unkinked!

Take a moment to consider. Would you place suspect electrical wiring onto a dead tree that was drying out to the state of kindling in any other circumstance? If you don't believe me then look on the internet at Xmas tree fires. Also, would you drape flammable fabrics (tinsel and streamers) in the form of tapers all over your living room? What can you do to make it better?

First thing is to banish candles, including T-lights etc. from any room or space with Xmas decorations. Candles and Xmas trees together could only be made more dangerous by placing a hungry tiger under the tree! Remember a couple of years ago when a celebrity's daughter was burned in a Halloween costume. That conflagration was started accidentally by a candle. Second, make sure the lights are in good condition. If the lights conform to BS EN 60598-2-20:1998 then that is even better. But if they show any signs of damaged wiring or they do not operate as they should (flickering etc.) then discard them. A repair may be possible, but it is likely to cost many times more than replacement. Third, water the tree.

Tree watering may not be as mad as it appears (after all this is a dead tree). If you have cut flowers in the house, then you would place them in vase full of water. Watering a Xmas tree uses the same principle. If buying a cut tree, then slice an inch (25mm) off the base and place in bucket of water until ready to bring it inside to trim with lights and baubles. Place in a firm clamp with a vessel under to allow the Xmas tree base to be submerged in water. If you let the tree base dry-out, then it is necessary to slice a further inch from the base because it forms a resin 'skin' which is impervious to water.

Another alternative is an artificial tree. However most artificial trees are from China. That may not be a bad thing, but few appear to be flame retarded. That means that all the safety factors required for the real tree are requires, except for the watering.

All the above applies to the home and recommended for safety but are not mandatory. If you have responsibility for a public space or workplace then guidance should be followed. The benchmarks are to keep trees and decorations away from escape routes (stairways and corridors) and flame retard the decorations and tree.

It sounds good advice for the home! Particularly because families get together during the festive season and there are often more sleeping in homes than at other times of the year. Remember to keep your escape routes clear and smoke alarms working.
