At the end of March several Councillors together with Residents attended the first of the CPR, AED Training Sessions, and whilst the subject was serious, all that attended said how informative it had been but enjoyable too. Thanks to Councillor Mark Jarnell both for his time and his expert advice.

Mark has also written an article regarding the Euxton Great Get Together to be held Saturday 17th June, plus Mark is also involved together with Councillors Neil Hall and Aidy Riggott and resident Lindsey Heaton in the ELFs, 'Euxton Library Friends', a meeting is arranged for June 12th.

The Council held a Special Full Council Meeting in April in order to nominate two Residents of Euxton for a 'Freedom of Euxton' honour, this hopefully will become an ongoing project.

The Bowling Green is moving at a pace now, and hopefully the works should begin end of June beginning of July, possibly allowing the Green to be ready for the start of the new season next year.

The Leisure Committee met May 11th and on its Agenda, was the new pond for the Millennium Green the next project on that site. After the work over the last months updating the footpaths, new gates etc., the Committee also discussed the planting of some trees and indigenous plants on the site.

Plus an additional project, in the early stages, is for the Greenside Play Areas to be updated, with new equipment, access paths re-laid and fencing replaced etc.

On May 23rd I will have the honour of representing Euxton Parish Council and its Residents at a Garden Party held at Buckingham Palace. The invitation arrived early April and I have purchased a hat for the occasion!

At the March 2017 Full Council meeting, the contractors for the various elements of the Bowling Green project at the Greenside recreational area were chosen.

The works to provide additional parking have already been completed, as have alterations to the pavilion.

The main contractor who will construct the actual Bowling green and additional elements, is contracted to commence development mid July 2017 (or earlier if available).

It is not envisaged that the new green will be playable this year, but later in the season, we will be looking to organise taster bowling sessions on a local green for anyone who is interested (new or existing bowlers will all be welcome).

Millennium Green Improvements

Work on the paths, including the new ramped access from Euxton Hall Gardens is now complete. The Parish Council hopes that users of the Green will enjoy the new paths and the improvements to the old paths, and that more local residents will take advantage of them. The Green is now available to wheelchair users, pram pushers and those who find steps a problem. Please let us know (clerk@euxtoncouncil.org.uk) if there are any difficulties and we will see what we can do about them.

The Green is such a beautiful and peaceful place, tucked away behind the high walls on Wigan Road and Dawbers Lane but still easily accessible. We are amazed at the number of local people who don't know about it or, if they do, don't use it.

And we are making it better.

We have engaged The Lancashire Wildlife Trust as our project managers to make a real pond to replace the part time pond in the north east area of the Green (ie nearest to the hospital and the houses). The intention is to replace it with a large, irregular and permanent pond with a wooden viewing platform (again fully accessible) on one corner. To keep the water level high the pond will have a liner and, although the water level will still go up and down to some extent, it won't dry out as it does now. The surplus material excavated from the pond will be used to create a series of rough hollows and ridges to one side of the pond that will be marshy in winter and probably dry out in summer (like the existing pond). We intend to stock both pond and the surrounding area with suitable, locally native wildflower planting. We are taking advice on the issue of stocking the pond with aquatic life - should we put something in or should we let it find its own way there?

The next step is to seek planning approval for the pond and we hope to submit an application shortly.

Many users have commented on the line of wooden stakes that have been placed across the west side of the Green - some concerned that they are the forerunner of a fence excluding users from the area beyond. Fear not. The area beyond the stakes on the west side will become a wildflower meadow and the stakes tell the contract grass mower not to mow that part of the Green until late in the year. This year we will just see what wildflowers are already there (first indications are 'not much') which will give us and our advisors guidance on what species will survive best. Again, we will only be using locally native species.



The Euxton Great Get Together

On **Saturday 17th June** 2017 between 12pm and 2pm residents of Euxton are invited to attend The Great Get Together at Greenside for a giant picnic.

The Great Get Together is inspired by Jo Cox, who was killed on 16 June last year. We believe there is a groundswell of people who reject divisive politics and simply want to bring our communities together and celebrate all that unites us. This is our chance.

As the Prime Minister said, when she remarked on Jo's death in her New Year's message: 2017 represents an opportunity to move forward and "bring this country together, as never before".

Jo's family and friends came up with the initiative, and The Big Lunch have teamed up with us to move their annual celebration.

The event will bring together our community to celebrate our differences and things we have in common.

This newsletter comments elsewhere on the planning application for housing development in the Green Belt at Gleadhill House which is just

to the west of the Green on Dawbers Lane. The proposal was unsuccessfully opposed by the Parish Council and we are disappointed that it was approved by the Borough Council. However, one minor concession that the applicant agreed was that a footpath link could be made between the Millennium Green and the footpath that runs through the woodland alongside Dawbers Lane. In future residents wishing to use this footpath will not need to walk along Wigan Road to the 'Hole in the Wall' but will be able to reach it by walking across the Green. A small, but nevertheless welcome improvement to offset against the loss of green fields at Gleadhill.

Planning Report

Two major planning applications, at Gleadhill House on Dawbers Lane, for houses to be built in the Green Belt and for the expansion of Balshaw Lane Primary School, were still going through the decision process when I reported for the last newsletter. They have now been completed, not greatly to the Parish Council's liking.

The applicant for Gleadhill House made the argument that they could either build a rather unsatisfactory and crowded housing development keeping within the bounds of the existing developed area or build a much more satisfactory development that needed spread across the houses to neighbouring field. This is doubtless true, most housing developments would be more pleasing if they had more space and less houses. For sure the resulting housing estate will be very attractive, from the developer's or the prospective purchasers' point of view or indeed from the view of anyone who will, in the future, pass by it. Before long none of us will remember that an open and undeveloped piece of Euxton's Green Belt was sacrificed to allow it. The Council hopes that this does not set a precedent for applications in the Green Belt, in the local area or elsewhere in Chorley. The Council was pleased to note that no new buildings will be required on open Green Belt land to replace the demolished stabling and equine exercise facilities.

At Balshaw Lane School the Council was successful in getting the County Council to carry out the missing Traffic Risk Assessment that would consider, amongst other matters, the impact on the surrounding housing Unfortunately, we were not areas. impressed with the Assessment when it came. The document was complacent and did not see any great problem with the extensive parking in the minor roads around the School - much of it on footpaths, blocking them for other users and causing friction with local residents. Indeed, the report considered that there was plenty more local road space available to accommodate increased parking generated by the School's expansion. So, residents who live just beyond the current extent of school parking, I'm afraid it's coming your way! It is interesting that the County Council, which is a highway authority, should advocate the increased use of illegal parking in order to meet its own development proposals. We did raise this issue with them but have not had a response. As many readers will know the work on expanding the School has already started.

The whole issue of parking at schools is fraught, and with no obvious solution available. All of our local schools have parking issues. For example, parking restrictions are currently going through the legal procedures for implementation near Primrose Hill School and on School Lane where parking takes place for both Euxton C of E and Euxton St Mary's Catholic Primary

Schools. Even a completely modern school in a modern designed environment, Trinity in Buckshaw, has similar problems.

A further planning application has been submitted in respect of the major development proposal for housing in the land between School Lane and Euxton Lane. Work has already started here as well, to create an entrance to the site from Euxton Lane. The site already had outline planning approval for its road access and for "up to" 170 houses and the new application is for the more detailed issues such as layout, drainage In fact, the developer has landscaping. reduced the number of houses on the site, from 170 to 140. The Parish Council has made a number of comments about details of the application, such as the issue of access to and parking for the proposed allotments on this site (the allotments are not part of the current application but, unless provision is made for access through the new estate, it will have to be taken from School Lane). The Council has also asked about the effects of draining the site into the surface water sewers at the junction of Orchard Close and School Lane. Houses on Orchard Close were badly affected in the floods of winter 2015/16.

Another nibble at the green fields between Euxton and Chorley has been approved at Pear Tree Farm on Pear Tree Lane. This is the replacement of Pear Tree Farm with three detached houses and large detached garages. The land is safeguarded for future development use under the Chorley Local Plan so perhaps housing sometime in the future is likely. This proposal has been accepted as being acceptable redevelopment of a previously developed site in the Green Belt (safeguarded land is treated as Green Belt land). It is clear from the planning documents that officers of the Borough Council were not unanimous on this point but the dissenting view was rejected. There is no doubt that the Tree Farm and its associated old Pear buildings were a rather unattractive development but, even so, three large houses and garages is a piece of suburbia introduced into what is, for the present, an area of countryside.

An interesting retrospective application has been submitted for a facility which many local residents will already be making good use of. The Filling Factory is a public bar inside a factory, a bottling plant, in Buckshaw. The Parish Council has no objection - the bar is a novel location that many will find interesting and which, as far as we know, is not causing any problems. What did surprise the Council was that a license to sell alcohol can be obtained for premises that do not have a valid planning approval allowing it to be used for that purpose.

we understand that Gladman Lastly, Developments are, as we rather expected, appealing against the rejection of their application for the large housing site on land off Pear Tree Lane and School Lane. More of this next time no doubt.

The First 'Freemen of Euxton'

At a Special Meeting of Euxton Parish Council on 20th April 2017, the Council bestowed the title of Freeman of Euxton on Mr Ken Anderton and Mr George Clarke. Below and over the page are their stories - the Council will be presenting the honour to these two special residents soon, and we will include a photo in the next issue.

Flying Horsa Survivor

Mr Ken Anderton: 39 School Lane Euxton: born 15 November 1918 (age 98), Magull, Liverpool.

Called up 1939: started training with 8th Irish Battalion (around 1000 men), Kings Regiment, Liverpool (2 years) made Sergeant, was a sniper and in intelligence.

Married Connie 1942 and had a son named Alan.

Progressed into 3 Army Air Core Regiment and started training with RAF, flying Tiger Moths and Miles Magister aircraft, then went into flying Horsa Gliders, after becoming a Pilot he graduated to Instructor went into action at Arnhem 1944.

He was the only member of his glider to return home after the war all others did not survive.

After the war Ken worked as a Gardener in the New Forrest around 1948 family moved to Surrey to work on a large Estate.

Sometime around 1980 Ken and Connie relocated to Euxton in order to be close to Ken's mother, who lived to be 102 years old. Ken has lived on School Lane for more than 36 years, sadly, Connie passed away a few years ago. Their son Alan now lives in Sweden with his family, he phones Ken daily and visits Euxton on a regular basis.

Ken thinks Euxton and School Lane is the best place to live in the world, and the residents of School Lane regard it as an honour and privilege to have Ken as their neighbour.



D-Day Veteran Honoured by the French

Who would have known that in Euxton we have a hero in our midst?

George Clarke now 96 has recently been honoured by the French people. French dignitaries presented the Second World War veteran with the country's highest honour, the Legion d'Honneur. The medal was presented by the Honorary French Consul Philip Daniel.

The Legion d'Honneur, or the Ordre national de la Le-gion d'honneur is Frances highest award. It is equivalent in the UK to the Victoria Cross the highest honour in the British system. The award was in recognition of Georges part in the liberation of France in 1944.

George now 96 first tried to join up at the age of 18, but because he was working for a company doing joinery work in connection with air raid shelters he was turned down.

He moved jobs to the production of the Lancaster Bomber in Trafford Park Manchester, and also became a member of the Home Guard. Then it happened he was called up initially to the RAF, but ended in the Army and following his training became a wireless operator.

Euxton Wellbeing Group

The Euxton Health and Wellbeing group for senior citizens was established with the help of Professor Romesh Gupta, OBE, FRCP, Chair of the National Forum for Health and Wellbeing. This is an organisation, based in the University of Bolton, which works to promote community health awareness and to empower communities to take charge of their own health. The Euxton group meets once a month in Euxton library, a central focus point for the village.



Neighbourhood Policing

Parish Councillors raised at the April meeting that the ancashire Neighbourhood Policing team had been reduced over the years and it had been noticed by increases in anti-social behaviour and willful damage acts in pockets of the village.

> The Council wrote to the Chief Constable of Lancashire Constabulary and the Police and Crime Commissioner.

> The local policing Inspector informed that "the current local team consists of a sergeant, a constable and two PCSOs. Resources have been reduced of late due to a temporary abstraction whilst a PC provided acting Sergeant duties at Skelmersdale. PCSO Gornall will be increasing her hours to full time from June. It is planned in the forthcoming months to align immediate response officers to the area and when not dealing with incidents will be available to default to support local policing 24/7." This was qualified with the Police - the second PCSO is only part time and not always in our area, but, will become full time in June. So the area has been depleted by a PC and a PCSO for months.

The Chorley & South Ribble Chief Inspector did say , "I can confirm that the staffing allocated to Euxton Village has not For more information see been reduced, certainly in the time I have had responsibility Chorley Police Facebook for Chorley and South Ribble." But - maybe we should look at what we do have - we have the best PCSO in the area - Ray - keep up the sterling work Ray.
