Chairman's Column

The Village Caretakers are now back at work, observing the relevant recommendations regarding their workplace and will slowly be getting on top of any work that is in need of doing however, if you see anything whilst you are out and about that you think requires attention please contact the Council on either our Facebook page or on the phone where they can be logged to be dealt with by Euxton, Chorley or even Lancashire depending on the problem.

The second Gladman appeal date for the building of houses on land around School Lane and Pear Tree lane will commence on June 23rd, a further objection has been sent by Euxton Parish Council, we await the outcome, further info on our website and Facebook the last date for objections is June 12th so if you should receive this newsletter before that date please consider sending in your own objection letters or emails.

The survey appears to have been well received and many residents have taken part, we await to receive the final results from Councillor Andy Oddy who, as I have mentioned before in previous newsletter, has taken this task on.

Euxton Council agreed its budget for this financial year, beginning 1st April 2020 running through to the end of March 2021.

Still less than £3 per month for all the Parish Council services

The Parish Council tax element for an average band D household will be £34.85, which has come down again on last years by approx 1.5%.

Council will continue with any ongoing projects, such as more planting, allotment site, the planned all weather court at Greenside along with a number of new projects suggested such as replacing its now very old Speed Indicator with more modern but fixed models running on solar power; footpath/cycleway project; eco project.

The Council is always searching for areas or ways it can provide additional recreation facilities or amenity areas around Euxton and Euxton Buckshaw - so any ideas you may have are welcome.

Residents who use the Millennium Green regularly may have noticed some temporary signage showing some useful information on the lengths of your possible walks around the Green.

The Green has been measured out and some suggested routes to achieve particular goals have been suggested. This was a suggestion made by the Clerk (who also did the artwork) to the Leisure Committee some time ago, who agreed it may be a useful addition for the Green.

This is meant as a useful guide to those of you who might have been interested to know how far they walk when they go around or through the Green regularly. Also, those who run or jog may find this 'ready' information useful.

There are measurements for a full perimeter route, either of the two halves of the Green and, a figure of eight route.


The Bronze, Silver and Gold goals are, again only for information, suggested goals which you could try to achieve whilst doing your regular exercise.

The Great Euxton Survey

The Parish Council's fact finding survey has ended and the results are excellent.

Council set about creating a survey to gather facts and information from residents to inform it of how residents feel about certain issues, what they want around the village and to gather information about current topics.



The information gathered will better inform the Council so it can tailor its activities to residents needs and defend or proactively campaign for changes or improvements in the area.

The last major survey was done some time ago and directly from that we gained information on facilities you wanted such as a bowling green, things you wanted to see such as more flowers and services you wanted more of such as litter picking and sweeping.

All the questions have not all been analysed yet but, to give an idea of the success of the exercise here are a few statistic graphs below.

The Council is very grateful to Cllr Andy Oddy for creating the survey and all the analysis he has done so far and will be continuing with until we have all the responses in a form we can use. More information will be in the next newsletter.





Election cancellations

What does it mean to Euxton?

You may have heard during Coronavirus the many announcements elections, due in May 2020, were cancelled - but not sure how this affects you as an Euxton

resident!

Euxton was not due to have a Parish Council election in May 2020 but it was due a Chorley Borough Council election. So now the Chorley Council election will be held in May 2021.

This move does though cause another hiccup as May 2021 is the year that Lancashire County Council elections will be taking place - these only happen every four

So in May 2021 there will now be a Chorley Borough Council election for 3 new representatives to cover the new 'Euxton' ward which takes in most of Euxton. A small area of residents in the South of Euxton are included in a neighbouring ward called Croston, Mawdesley and Euxton South and a number of residents in Buckshaw Euxton are included in the new Buckshaw & Whittle ward.

Besides the Chorley Council election residents will be voting in the Lancashire County Council elections and the Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) elections which were also cancelled in May 2020.

Councillor Vacancies in Euxton North & South



Presently there are vacancies for Parish Councillors on the Council in Euxton North West and Euxton South, following resignations. There has been no call for an election so the vacancies can be filled by co-option.

Applications are invited and any person wishing to serve as a Councillor should write to the Clerk giving details of interests, experience and reasons for wishing to serve.

To qualify, a person must be a British subject or citizen of the Irish Republic, over 18 years of age and an elector, must reside within the parish of Euxton, or within 3 miles of it, or occupy as owner or tenant any land or premises therein, or have their principal or only place of work there, and must not be disqualified from holding office as a Councillor (details from the Clerk).

Co-opting will take place at the next Council meeting.

Further details of eligibility, procedures of a vacancy, guidance of being a Parish Councillor for Euxton are all available on request from the Clerk or linked on the Council's website to the vacancy notice.

Although sadly I don't live in Euxton any more, it was my home for ten years and I have very fond memories of my time Managing Euxton Community Centre, working at Busy Bodies Nursery and also Euxton Hall Hospital.

Regardless of having lived in Chorley for the last four years and now working in Buckshaw Village, I am still keen to be involved with Euxton heritage projects and I'm sure there will be a few more in the coming years.

The village has a great heritage and it has always been a privilege to research and share the stories and information of the past with the community.

Over the years I have written books about the history of Euxton CE Primary school, ROF Chorley, and also "Euxton Then & Now" and "Euxton Remembers" with Euxton historian Susan Balshaw. The village also featured in my books about the Chorley and District Spitfire and a directory of Military Memorials in the Borough of Chorley. In addition, historical stories about the village have featured often in my history features in the Chorley Guardian and of course, the Euxton Web newsletter.

Euxton Remembers





It has been a privilege to compile this very special Euxton Web supplement to mark the 75th Anniversary of the end of World War Two. Euxton Parish Council has a great track record of commemorating the history of the village and it is hoped that this simple tribute goes some way to marking the significance of this anniversary year.

Whilst we remember the ultimate sacrifice made by 19 men of Euxton during the war, it is important to remember and show gratitude for the service of those who returned and to acknowledge the impact on the civilian population during a conflict which King George VI at the time said "...can no longer be confined to the battlefield."

Many fund raising campaigns ran through Chorley Borough and this included the residents of Euxton. Over £6,000 was raised as part of the Spitfire Fund which led to the building of a Spitfire in 1941.

Similarly, 'Warship Week' ran ... SUBMARINE URSULA through Chorley and District from 31st January 1942 to 7th February 1942 and the target was to raise enough to



sponsor the pre-designated submarine H.M.S/m 'Ursula'. Above and beyond the amount was raised, Chorley duly sponsored 'Ursula' and the crew visited the town in 1943 and presented the local authority with a plaque of appreciation from the Admiralty.



The people that would once have been seen as innocent bystanders of war, were now taking an active role. Most now viewed contributors or defenders and as such, became seen as legitimate targets by the enemy.

The proximity of the ROF posed a very real risk for the residents of Euxton. The sound of aeroplanes would naturally cause concern that it was an enemy bomber searching for the factory. Contrary to popular belief, a number of incendiary devices did fall within the perimeter wall but did not cause any damage. In Euxton there was a plan in place that the school bell of the National School (now Euxton Community Centre) would be rung in the event of an air raid. Children from the school became well practised in using the cellar of the Parish Church Vicarage as an air raid shelter.




The famous 'Dambuster' raids of 16th/17th May 1943 by No.617 Squadron, which breached the dams of Germanys industrial heartland with 'bouncing bombs', had connections with ROF Chorley.

It was revealed after the war that the 'bouncing bombs' were filled at ROF Chorley and was visited by the mission Commanding Officer Guy Gibson. Although the successful raids did not disrupt German production for too long a period to make a difference, it was a great propaganda coup for the British and Allies.

At the beginning of World War Two, ROF employed about 1,000 people. By 1940 this figure had risen to 15,000; rising drastically to around 40,000 at its peak. At one stage, the factory became the largest ammunition filling establishment in the world. These facts and figures show the magnitude of production at the site and ultimately, just how important a role it played during the war.

A large number of employees resided at Highways Hostel (now the Highways Avenue and estate) the residential complex of what is now the



Astley Hall in Chorley holds a plague commemorating the US Armed Forces based at Washington Hall, Euxton. The plaque was presented to Chorley at the end of the war at a large social event. The Americans celebrated the end of hostilities with massive bonfires throughout the Washington Hall estate, burning amongst other things, their administration office furniture.



Towards the end of the war, the Government started to recognise the contribution of members of the Armed Forces with the award of campaign medals. However, it is important to remember that it

wasn't just men who saw uniformed service. Women not only enlisted to work in the Munitions Factories (such as ROF Chorley) producing bullets and grenades, etc, they were also breaking down the social barriers yet further and becoming involved even closer with the military. Young women were being trained up as Pilots for example, and as such would ferry newly produced aircraft to their designated squadrons and airfields and many joined the Women's Land Army.

On 29th November the Battalion was hit by two shells from a self-propelled gun which killed 19 men, on of them being Walter.

Comments: William was killed when his Halifax bomber (LL343) crashed during a raid on the night of 30th/31st August. His aircraft was shot down by flak fired from ships of the German Navy and crashed into the North Sea. It is believed that the Halifax was taking part in a secret mission, which could refer to anything from targeting a specific location or dropping agents behind enemy lines. The file relating to the operation that William was taking part in is still closed to public viewing, but it is believed that the aircraft was dropping supplies to partisans near Diest or taking part in a SOE mission, under the code name Osric 122

Comments: The 1/5th Battalion, Welch Regiment arrived in Normandy on 29th June 1944, and was straight into the thick of the action pushing the enemy eastward. They took part in heavy fighting at Falaise, Martigny, Eindhoven, Arnhem, Hertogenbosch, Baexem, Menil and in the Reichswald Forest. John was killed during an offensive to clear the German town of Rethem and sadly the war in Europe would be over within a month of his death

Unfortunately the ship was bombed and a piece of shrapnel tore through the ship and into the wash house. It passed by both of his friends but struck Bert severely injuring him. The ship stayed afloat and made it across the Channel to Dover. Bert's friends stayed with him to ensure he was taken safely into Hospital

On 22nd May 1941, while in the Kithera Channel about 4 miles north of Crete, HMS Gloucester was attacked by German Stuka Dive Bombers and sank. Only 85 from 807 men survived.

Gornall was killed during this attack.



Wilfred was killed when the Green Howards were carrying out a diversionary attack across the River Moletta, whilst a main attack moved towards Rome.

The missile exploded in the engine room and caused extensive fires which could not be controlled, and the ship capsized and sank. 46 of the 530 crew were killed, including Kenneth.

The submarine and crew was reported overdue on 12th December 1942 and it was concluded that it had probably struck an Italian mine and

lost with all hands.

Euxton's War Memorial

Euxton War Memorial 5th Anniversary 2020

Around Chorley borough new war memorials and fund raising the group acquired the necessary funds to additions to existing ones, have continued to be erected. Many of these memorials have been to specific groups of men, such as the Chorley Pals, or to rectify omissions to an existing memorial, such as with the addenda panels on the Adlington & District War Memorial.

Sadly, some additions are in relation to current casualties of conflict. However, Euxton saw a unique project in the borough because a voluntary group sought to erect the first all-inclusive public war memorial monument in the village.

'Euxton War Memorial Group' was formally established on 21st February 2011. Although Euxton had Church war memorials and a Memorial Club, there was not a public memorial; ie/ one that could be accessed at any time, regardless of religious or licensing protocol. With the support of Euxton Parish Council and Euxton Parish Church (with the backing of Blackburn Diocese), Euxton War Memorial Group identified an eligible roll of honour of casualties from 1914 to the present day. Through constant Julie Snape, and Lynn Longton.

erect a war memorial for the community to take ownership of and take pride in.


The memorial was eventually unveiled and dedicated on Sunday 12th July 2015 and as we approach its fifth anniversary, in 2020 we also acknowledge the 75th anniversary of the end of World War Two, a conflict which saw a further 19 Euxtonians make the Ultimate Sacrifice.

Fault reporting to Lancashire Council

Reporting faults to Lancashire County Council is quite quick and simple using their fault reporting system. LCC deal with roads, pavements, street and traffic lights, drainage grids at the side of the road, and more. Go to the Lancashire website:

Below the large red 'Report It' button are the following options to choose from.



For an example, if you choose 'Pothole' you would be presented with some instructions about the size of potholes and how to report and below that a 'start now' button. This leads you on to inputting a location from a post code or 'use my current location' and then on to a map where you can pin point the pothole but, it also gives information about other reported potholes in that area, also recently completed jobs.

Most of the reporting buttons present you with a map so the exact location can be pin pointed - if there is an asset such as a street light then these will be identified on the maps when you push the button to report.

Here on the map the street light columns are indicated as a yellow triangle with a number click on the one which is faulty and it takes you to a form to complete.

The icons on the site help guide you to reporting and the one you want will be the 'Report It' icon

When you click the 'Report It' icon you get further set of 6 sub category icon options, seen on the bottom line of the site capture here:




For this example we will report a litter bin problem so you would choose 'Clean Streets' in the above menue, then 'Litter bins' in the next drop down menu



When you click the litter bin icon you are presented with a map near to your address (if you are registered) or, put in a postcode at the top and it reveals all the litter bins locations in that area (or move the map to your required location).

Click on the problem bin - it will put a yellow circle around the bin you choose then click 'NEXT' at the bottom of the page and proceed to fill in the questions on the form and submit.



So as another example, for a dead animal at the side of the road, from the example icons above you would choose the 'Animal Welfare' icon to reveal three further reporting sub-categories to choose from.
