
Annual Council Meeting

Network Rail works to stop the flooding closure of Euxton Lane and School Lane

First the good news! In July Network Rail will start work to build a new pipeline to replace the old, broken one that has been the cause of flooding in Euxton Lane and School Lane many times before and, worst of all, in this last winter. This will solve the problem once and for all.

And so to the bad news! Throughout the works, expected to be on site from middle of July for about twelve weeks, both Euxton Lane and School Lane will be closed to traffic at the rail bridges. It certainly makes you wonder if the solution isn't worse than the problem that gave rise to it. But the work needs doing. Euxton can't go on losing one of its most important roads and another locally important one every time it rains very long and hard and, sooner or later, something was going to happen that would cause even more problems for the village and precipitate the need for these works. The Parish Council and others pressed for these works to be done and are pleased that Network Rail has bit the bullet and is going to get on with them.

Members of the Parish Council have met with Network Rail to discuss these works. We were obviously concerned about the long term road closures and about Network Rail proposals

for a site compound off Wigan Road alongside Chapel Brook, in the dip to the south of the Parish Church. We questioned Network Rail on these matters and reluctantly had to accept that what was proposed was necessary if the works were to succeed. Network Rail, using a modern and specialist technique, are to install a new pipe, at some considerable depth (for example the pipe goes under a sewer in School Lane), from near Euxton Lane to Chapel Brook, in railway land and alongside the railway line.

So, for this long period, partly in school holidays but partly in term time, Euxton will have to live with these two roads closed to through traffic. Residents will remember that closure of Euxton Lane last winter caused many problems for the village not least through the use of minor roads as alternatives, primarily School Lane but also Pear Tree Lane, Whinney Lane and Washington Lane. The signed diversions, on main roads, were, in the Council's view, badly signed and although they did not use minor roads, contained no measures to discourage their use.

The Council has secured the following promises from Network Rail:

- 1) Euxton Lane and School Lane will only be closed to traffic under the bridges and for a minimal necessary distance beyond. It will be possible to access all properties on, or served by the two roads, but only from one end. There will be no through traffic.
- 2) a footpath connection will be retained through the bridges. So pedestrians, including pupils going to and from the various schools, will be able to follow their normal routes

The Council has also pressed both Network Rail and Lancashire County Council (who will have to agree all the proposed road closures, diversion routes, traffic signing etc) to ensure that the signing is of a much better order than last winter and that measures are taken to discourage the use of minor roads by traffic ignoring the signed diversion and looking for alternatives.

In one respect, the closure of School Lane as well as Euxton Lane is advantageous in that School Lane will not, this time, be the alternative route that many motorists use when ignoring the signed diversions. This will prevent the much too high volumes of traffic from using School Lane and conflicting with the many pedestrians who also use it. However, there the advantage ends, if traffic insists on diverting off Euxton Lane and on to Pear Tree Lane only to find that School Lane is closed. Where does it go then - turn around in a narrow country lane or find a way along Pear Tree Lane to Washington Lane. The prospect of too many vehicles meeting on the bad bends along Pear Tree Lane is worrying.

The Parish Council will be watching the works for you as they progress and will contact Network Rail and/or Lancashire County Council if necessary. No matter how well Network Rail conduct the works, this will be a difficult time for the village. Can we ask you to be patient, follow the signed diversion routes, do not use the minor lanes and help each other find ways around the difficulties that will inevitably arise.

Neighbourhood area consists of Euxton, Buckshaw Village and Astley Village.

Because of concerns that cars coming off Southport Road into the side street leading to the Yarrow Valley Car Park where the skate park is located, are travelling quite fast and may be unaware of the pedestrians often using this area.

As this is the entrance to a number of areas such as the skate park, the Yarrow Valley walk and the cricket club there are often residents, many of them younger residents, walking in this area.

To help bring this to the attention of vehicles, there will be bumps installed. Also, the first section of this road is to resurfaced, with a drain installed down the side to prevent the large puddling which occurs and fill the potholes so vehicles do not have to drive around these obstacles.

All these measures are to create a safer environment for visitors using this area.

This work is programmed to take place in late May and, all being well, will cause little disruption for the residents and users of the area. Whilst the work is taking place some of the large holes on the Chorley car park for the Yarrow Valley Country Park will be filled with the spoil shaved off the tarmac road surface, 'recyling and re-using at its best!'

Millennium Green Improvements

The Millennium Green is a beautiful place and one of the Euxton Parish Council's (EPC) most treasured assets - a lovely natural looking area of mixed trees and open grassland with a woodland background. There is a pond and some wet areas, a path around the perimeter and seating provided at several locations both on and off the path. The Green is close to and accessible from large parts of the Parish on foot and from the whole Parish by car. It is a very pleasant place for residents (and their dogs) to go for relaxation and for gentle exercise.

EPC holds the Green on a long term lease from Chorley Borough Council (CBC) and, when it took over the Green, EPC planted lots of young trees, laid the perimeter path and provided the seating. EPC is responsible for the upkeep of the Green (residents should not be confused by the fact that CBC cut the grass on the Green under contract to EPC). However the terms of the lease restrict the manner in which EPC can use the land. It has to be used as public open space and has many restrictions so that, for example, it cannot be used for trade or camping or keeping animals. No buildings, permanent or temporary, can be erected.

Not that the EPC wishes to make any radical changes to the Green or to change the way it is used. It wants the Green to remain an attractive, peaceful place for residents and others to enjoy relaxation and gentle exercise. However, EPC would like to see more residents use and enjoy the facilities offered by the Green and is considering how to achieve this. At present the vast majority of users of the Green are dog walkers (and very welcome they are too, provided they clear up any mess) and the EPC feels that it could be used much more by residents with or without dogs.

A proposal for improvements to the Green will be put forward to the EPC for consideration at their June meeting. The objective of the improvements will be simply to increase the use of the Green for casual recreation and exercise without significantly altering its character. They are expected to have the following elements:

- 1) improvements to the existing path to make it more walkable in all weathers and conditions (it gets rather muddy and dirty because the water cannot drain away)
- 2) a new path across the middle of the Green, passing between mature trees, through one of the areas of young trees and across some of the marshy areas. This will give users of the green more alternatives and more variations in their choice of walks
- 3) more of a feature to be made of the pond. This virtually dries out in summer but floods extensively in winter and wet weather. Perhaps its permanent size could be increased and some of the banks made generally accessible. An area of decking and a link to the main path would make it accessible for all, including wheelchair users, at all times of the year
- 4) creation of new and extension of existing natural habitats (including the pond) to create visual interest and more opportunities for animals, birds, plants, insects etc
- 5) a review of management practices to see if they can be changed to assist with the above improvements. For example a different grass cutting programme might be more helpful to areas of wildflower planting.

Housing proposals for safeguarded fields

A residents' meeting took place on Wednesday 11th May at St Mary's Social Club to discuss opposition to the proposed extensive development of green fields between Euxton Lane/ School Lane/ Pear Tree Lane.

Around 70 residents attended the meeting, along with Chorley Borough Councillors and Parish Councillors. Everyone agreed that the whole village need to be aware of how the proposed development of 300+houses will impact on our village amenities and highways.

Residents kindly donated over £100 towards erecting visible banners and printing leaflets to raise awareness.

Since the meeting, notice of a planning application has been submitted for Pear Tree Greens, this is the green fields between Euxton Lane and School Lane.

The application can be viewed and written comments submitted to Chorley Borough Council by 31 May 2016. Ref. 16/00380/OUTMAJ.

Whilst development to Pear Tree Greens is allowed within the Local Plan, as this was approved by the Government Inspector only after extensive consultation; residents were united in the belief that this development is not needed at this time, as the village lacks the infrastructure to absorb the current commitment to housing development in the local area.

Only written comments, submitted to the Council, will shape the decisions made for development of this area.





There is also vigorous opposition to Gladman's housing development consultation for the area of green fields between Pear Tree Lane and School Lane because Chorley Borough Council have safeguarded this land, within the Local Plan until beyond 2026. Many local people enjoy the Lanes and will want to keep Euxton's green and pleasant lands.



In principle opposition to development of Pear Tree Lane/School Lane can also be registered now, in writing or online with Chorley Borough Council.

Residents volunteered to form a committee to organise an Euxton wide

campaign, bring together key facts and ensure all residents are informed about proposed developments. Many people volunteered to help by sharing news of this development and submitting their comments.

was brought to residents' attention that Lancashire come along and take part, For further information about County Council (LCC) was consulting on the future of the training nights and times contact Dennis Winn on county library service and, that might put Euxton's 07595541404 or dswinn@live.co.uk library under threat.

The first phase of consultation on library service design, need and use took place during January across Lancashire. The consultation resulted in 10.566 questionnaires being returned comprising of 4,607 paper-based and 5,959 online.

LCC's latest position is: "Changes to where we provide your services - LCC provides local communities with a wide range of different services, based in hundreds of buildings across the county. We are planning some changes to how and where many of these services are provided the cabinet considered reports about this in early May and a 12 week consultation begins from Wednesday 18 May to 14 August.

The services that will be mainly affected are:

- -Libraries
- -Wellbeing, prevention and early help (incorporating children's centres and young people's centres)
- -Registration offices (births, marriages and deaths)
- -Children's services
- -Youth offending teams
- -Adult disability day services
- Older people's daytime support services
- -Welfare rights services"

The main changes LCC are planning to consult about are:

- -To reduce the number of different buildings where these services are available, while still ensuring services are available at locations across the county.
- -To create a network of 'Neighbourhood Centres' through which we will deliver services

LCC says, "We know how important these services are to the people who use them and will be keen to hear your views."

It appears at the moment Euxton Library is not on the list for closure but this is still subject to change from consultation results so please respond to the consultation to keep up the fight to save Euxton Library.



The centenary of the Battle of the Somme will be recognised nationally in July and Chorley has as much reason as anywhere to commemorate the anniversary. Many stories have been told about the men of the Chorley Pals but it is the Battle of the

Somme which binds them together.

Chorley boroughs band of brothers trained and served together and went into Battle on 1st July and suffered terrible casualties.

To mark the centenary the Chorley Pals Memorial have been working hard to develop a series of commemorative events. The full programme has vet announced but local Historian and Trustee of the group, Stuart Clewlow has shared details of one special arrangement.

"Chorley Pals Memorial are proud to present Leyland Band at Chorley Town Hall with a very special concert 'Pals on Parade', a selection of World War One era and military music

We are particularly excited to be hosting the debut playing in Chorley of "The Pals March". The piece was composed in 1914 and has been specially reworked for us to be performed by a brass band."

"In a poignant act of solidarity Chorley Council and South Ribble Borough Council have both sponsored the event and will be represented by the Mayors and their consorts.

A number of Chorley Pals before and after the war, had various connections to the communities making up todays neighbouring boroughs and so it is a credit to both authorities for acknowledging the poignancy of the occasion."

The concert is expected to be extremely well received and people are encouraged to react quickly and contact either Chorley Pals Memorial or Leyland Band to purchase their tickets. As a further form of tribute, those attending are encouraged to wear self earned medals or those awarded to their relatives.

Many men from Euxton were involved in the Battle of the Somme and the newly erected war memorial near the Community Centre, includes the name of Frederick Sydney Harding. He lived at Sunnymede on Wigan Road and whilst serving with the "City Pals" Manchester Regiment, he was killed in action on 1st July.

Richard Barrow also lived on Wigan Road and served

Dickie Barrow

with the Chorley Pals. He was badly injured during the Battle of the Somme but survived the war and lived until he was 93 and one of the last surviving Chorley Pals.

He was buried in St Mary's Church yard along with his crucifix which he had worn whilst serving in the trenches.


