# Chairman's Column

Welcome to the March 2016 issue of the Euxton Web which details all the news and events in and around Euxton for the coming months.

The new Website is up and running, the proposed Bowling Green and Boules project is moving forward plus the 'litter pick' campaigns, 'save Euxton Library' and the expansion of

Primrose Hill School - The Euxton Web has it all.

Euxton Parish Council has recently, over recent weeks received calls, letters and emails from residents concerned about the flooding during December/January, please find an article by Councillor Thornhill (page 3) and, be rest assured that this matter will be monitored and reported on over the next months.

There have also been queries over the new development on Euxton Lane/Pear Tree Lane/School Lane and Greenside.

These sites have for some time, in fact several years, in the case of Euxton Lane area been "set aside" land, not "green belt" or even "green fields", and had been put forward by Chorley Council to be drafted into the Chorley Local Plan, for new home building in Euxton.

Early in 2013 several Parish Councillors and Residents set up a Working Group in an attempt to change this and allow the 'fields' to remain as they are at present. Leaflet drops were undertaken, meetings at the "Insti", where over 80 residents attended together with at least four of the Euxton Borough Councillors and an independent chairman, together with information in the Euxton Web newsletter delivered quarterly to all residents, updates on the Website plus of course the monthly Parish Council Meetings.

A Government Inspector Hearing of all relevant parties regarding the Chorley Local Plan, was heard in the late summer of 2013, attended by several Parish Councillors and Residents to place their concerns regarding these developments in Euxton. The conclusion was that the plan was considered "sound in all regards" and has now been adopted, in early 2014.

After what feels like a very long and wet Winter, the Spring can't come soon enough. Let us hope for a warm and dry one!!

Once again details of forthcoming Full Parish Council Meetings for March to June 2016 are listed inside, usually start 7.15pm and all other Committees are shown on the Noticeboards around Euxton as well as the Web Site.

# Seven year fall for Euxton's Council Tax

In January Euxton Council confirmed its budget for the coming financial year beginning in April 2016 running through to March 2017.

For the seventh consecutive year, the element paid by Euxton residents to the Parish Council has reduced, and this year will be just £24.37 (for an average hand D property)

We are now looking for suggested locations and partner organisations to work with on this project.



# **Euxton Flooding**

Although not as severely as some northern towns and villages (and not least our neighbours in Croston), Euxton suffered badly in the flooding over Christmas and New Year. No doubt about it, the weather was exceptional with rain and wind, off and on, seemingly for days on end. The only consolation was that the temperatures kept high - until a short frosty spell in the middle of January - but at times that wasn't much of a consolation.

The headline grabber was Euxton Lane which flooded badly under the railway bridge near the Bay Horse. Two things made this particularly annoying.

First, that it happened at all. After a long history of flooding here Network Rail were finally persuaded to do the necessary works, in October 2011 to prevent it from happening again! Needless to say their services were not disrupted by Euxton's inconvenience.

Secondly, long after the water had drained away from everywhere else (and sympathy goes to people in all of those in places like Croston, who are still clearing up the mess), Euxton Lane continued to be closed and continued closed for over three weeks. During this time traffic and pedestrians had to be diverted. There was some criticism of the diversion signing and of the fact that much of the traffic displaced did not use the diversion route, or other major road alternatives, but joined the pedestrians on dark, narrow, twisting School Lane and Pear Tree Lane.

The Parish Council has sent a strong letter to LCC and others about this and will keep up the pressure on them and Network Rail to really make sure it doesn't happen again (but - just in case it does - to manage it better next time). This has generated very prompt and positive responses from LCC and Network Rail and the helpful support of Lindsay Hoyle MP.

At least Euxton achieved some measure of fame. Euxton Lane featured on the internet, the national press and the television news with bizarre videos of jet skis, kayaks and divers enjoying the setting of the road, the water, the street furniture and the railway. Almost overnight a new family of urban myths grew up, with tales of lost cars and contents adding numbers and layers by the day, fit to rival the lost steam trains in the tunnels of Heapey. Were any of them true?




Photo of the flood under the railway bridge at Euxton Lane, this was not at its full flood height

But, Euxton Lane, newsworthy though it was, was only part of the story. All over the parish, and at various times before and after Christmas but with Boxing Day night the worst, local floods have been causing damage, flooding buildings and gardens, blocking roads, soaking pedestrians as cars ploughed through water, making streams and ponds where they haven't been before. One noticeable feature was the number of floods in roads caused by blocked gullies and drainage channels and ditches. These are usually Lancashire County Council's responsibility and their website (www.lancashire.gov.uk) has a good facility for reporting these (or any other highway faults). Please use it if you see flooding occurring for this reason www.lancashire.gov.uk



One concern of the Parish Council is all the extra development that is scheduled to be located in Euxton and which will turn fields and trees into roads and houses and cause more water to run off into roads and sewers and into natural ditches and streams. Even Buckshaw, with all its modern infrastructure did not come out unscathed and there is plenty more development set to take place there.

The Parish Council will continue to try to ensure that new developments do have the measures necessary to ensure that they do not make it even more likely that the events of the past few weeks will happen again.

# Library History

At a time when all of Chorley's beloved Libraries find themselves at risk of closure, it is worth sharing some details about Euxton Library.

Euxton Library, off St. Mary's Gate was officially opened in 1966 at a time when the population of the village was close to 3,500. The building was extended and refurbished in 2009.

Today the Library has developed from the quiet books-only venue, into an active, well resourced social hub. Of course the books are still readily available but also DVDs, resources for those with disability or difficulty, resources for all ages and a useful IT network. In addition, a number of social organisations frequent the Library and it is well used as a venue for public consultation, as well as educational and entertaining presentations.

The story and growth of Euxton Library is similar to those in Adlington, Coppull, and Eccleston for example. All now exist and thrive offering similar resources and facilities to the residents who have come to see them as a permanent and expected fixture of their community. 

#### Euxtronomy

It is with enormous pleasure and gratitude that I can announce to fellow Euxtonians the (official) unveiling of a new community group, 'Euxtronomy' launched officially in February 2016. After starting the group informally in late 2014 my hopes of finding local budding, amateur and professional astronomers were quickly realised and by mid 2015 our group of enthusiastic local sky watchers were gathering regularly to talk

about all things heavenly, to learn and to observe the night sky.

We were lucky last year in the UK to observe a solar and a lunar eclipse, meteor showers, comets and the northern lights not to mention all the fabulous photos of deep sky objects, our lunar companion and panoramic sky pictures sent in to our social media page from our group and also more experienced astronomical groups from around the UK. This year we have already seen a UK astronaut aboard the ISS, and our 5 closest naked eye planets Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter and Saturn were all observable at the same time within the months of January and February, and more recently - nacreous clouds, and there is so much more to come throughout the rest of this year.

Euxtronomy is aiming to build an astronomical observatory for the Euxton community and for our local educational establishments, if you are interested in the night sky and would like to come to our meetings to see what we are about please visit our website at www.euxtronomy.org.uk for meeting and observing dates. We really want to grow the group and make it a Northwest success, we are very diverse and welcome beginners, professionals and amateur astronomers, so please come along.

# **Chorley Flower Show 2016**

Chorley Flower Show is back for its second year after a fantastic inaugural event that saw 10,000 visitors enjoy a floral extravaganza, which was nominated as a finalist in the Lancashire Tourism Awards.

The event, which is being run by Chorley Council in the beautiful setting of Astley Park, will attract thousands of green-fingered enthusiasts over the weekend 30 and 31 July.

The focal point for the show will be the Hall itself, as well as the Grand Floral Marquee, with the country's top exhibitors displaying their talents.

We had lots of brilliant feedback from our first show last year and we have taken all this on board to make it bigger and better and we hope to attract more than 15,000 people this year. Building work is underway on a £3.7 million project to create a permanent expansion at one of the village's outstanding schools. The project, which is being funded by Lancashire County Council and is being delivered by one of its partner contractors, Parkinson's, will see a new hall, eight classrooms, a playground and a playing field added to the existing building at its site on Primrose Hill Road. In addition, four existing classrooms will be remodelled and increased in size and three new offices will be created.



The building work, which commenced on 4th January 2016, is due to be completed by December 2016 and will allow the school to continue to admit 60 pupils per year on an annual basis. The school had already agreed a temporary expansion, which enabled 60 pupils to join the school for the academic year 2015/16. Following a public consultation, LCC confirmed that the expansion would be made permanent in October and planning permission was then sought.

Headteacher, Gareth Caunce, said "This is an extremely exciting time for everyone connected with Euxton Primrose Hill Primary School and we are very much looking forward to offering even more pupils the opportunity to attend a school of which we are very proud. We are delighted that our facilities will be greatly improved and that we will be able to offer our pupils the highest standard of accommodation as well as improving our playground and sporting facilities. It also allows us to further improve our extra-curricular provision, which is something that we are extremely passionate about."

"The thriving school currently offers up to 80 places in its out of school club, which operates in the school hall, and this restricts the school to having to hold extra-curricular activities outside or in classrooms. The addition of a second hall means that the school will be able to offer many more clubs and pupils will benefit greatly from this."

Mr. Caunce added, "Healthy living is an integral part of the school's vision for education and I am delighted that we will be able to inspire pupils to enjoy even more sporting activity with the addition of a second hall. The school has already achieved the Sainsbury's gold mark for sporting provision and we are now looking to build on this excellent achievement. We have wanted to develop the sporting facilities at school for the last couple of years and this project will allow us to fulfil this ambition. However, unfortunately during the building phase it does mean that we do not have access to a playing field and we are immensely grateful to Euxton Parish Council who have kindly agreed to let us use the council pitches on Greenside for our annual sports day.'



The school is incorporating the building work into its curriculum and many classes are documenting the change in the school's facilities by taking pictures on a daily basis. One year group, who are studying the topic of 'changes in my area' are gaining first-hand experience of why and how places change and this is providing real stimulation for their learning. # Recycling

Chorley Council would like to residents to double check the items they put out for recycling as part of a drive by Chorley Council to ensure the right stuff goes in the right bin.

This is because truck loads could be rejected at the recycling plant in Farington if they are 'contaminated' by non-recyclable household waste being placed incorrectly in blue bins, or if items are not sorted correctly.

This has not really been an issue before as, unless the bin is badly contaminated with non-recyclable materials, it has been emptied as usual. But recently rules have tightened which means that the recycling plant could reject loads that are contaminated which would ultimately have an impact on the cost of collections.

The majority of items are correctly sorted and recycled by residents but recent checks have revealed a number of items wrongly put in the blue bin including recycling cardboard, textiles, black bags, food waste, toys, CDs and DVDs, batteries, nappies, furniture and ceramics.

Cardboard, glass bottles and jars and tins/drinks cans are straightforward enough but please remember, not all plastics can be recycled, just those marked 1 or 2 which are plastic bottles not yoghurt pots, butter or margarine cartons, plastic carrier bags or plastic now causing are which contamination issues at the plant.

If in doubt, leave it out and instead put it in the green refuse bin which is for all other household rubbish, or take it to the Household Waste Recycling Centre at Lower Burgh.


