Chairman's Column



Welcome to September's issue of the 'Euxton Web' which details both news and events in and around Euxton.

My first duty again is to welcome a new Parish Councillor Mr Phil Preston who was co-opted at the

June 2019 Meeting. Phil was one of the several applicants that requested their names be put forward again after the previous co-option held in March

As mentioned in previous issues the Allotment Project is slowly progressing with the proposed lease for the land received from Chorley BC having been considered by the Allotment Committee. Thanks to Parish Councillor Andy Oddy for his time and expertise in this matter. The site was recently cut back and a tidied up around the edges so Committee members could visit and be able to see and assess the area, it is quite a large piece of land.

After noticing a request from Parklands School for gardening equipment, our Clerk, Debra Platt, contacted the school and EPC have donated two old pieces of equipment, namely a strimmer and a hedge cutter for the school's ECO group - the teacher tells us he will report on the groups progress soon.

I was invited, at the end of July, as were other Parish Councillors to an afternoon tea by the WI in the Community Centre, it was very well attended and the cakes were delicious again, many thanks to everyone at the WI.

The wild flower meadow on the Millennium Green is now in full bloom and looks wonderful as do the flower beds, hanging baskets and the displays on the walls on Wigan Road and on Euxton Lane traffic islands. The play area next to Primrose Hill School has had replacement benches installed, together with new play equipment. Lighting is to be installed at the Skate Park and also hoping to improve other play areas in particular Mile Stone Meadow after discussions with Chorley BC regarding funding.

Gala day was again a huge success and Councillors were busy keeping up with the demand for the Euxton bags, Newsletters and Pens etc., together with the Friends of Euxton Library stall which also was well visited.

A small housekeeping note, EPC is providing more doggy bins and bags around the area.

As at going to print the planning application for 180 houses on Pear Tree / School Lane awaits discussion and consideration by Chorley BC Planning Committee, an objection to this has been forwarded to Chorley from the Parish Council.

Further details of all activities are as usual within the pages of the Newsletter, together with dates of Full Council meetings should anyone wish to attend.



Allotments for Euxton - update

Following on from the introduction, in the last newsletter, of the possibility of allotments for Euxton here is an update on progress.

The negotiation of a lease from Chorley Council to the Parish Council for this land, which can only be allotments, has proved to be difficult but (at this time of writing) there is a glimmer of light at the end of the tunnel.

This delay did not halt the parish council making progress though... it has been cracking on with some of the background items which need to be put in place such as a plot holders licenses, an allotment policy, site investigations, checking on items such as insurance and much much more.

On site, the Parish Council had the grass cut back as it was way above waist height, this has assisted in the location of grids and obstacles in the land and also enabled a tree survey, and investigations of the already present ditch system to assess its effectiveness.

Due to the delay mentioned, the Committee cannot continue with its estimate of the site being ready for growing in 2020 due to the already long list of tasks still to get through, one such being the gaining of planning permission. The committee did commit in the last newsletter to opening up the waiting list - which it feels it can still continue with.

Waiting list process

To get on the Allotment Waiting List you need to fill out an 'Expression of Interest' form. Fill and return the form to Euxton Council before the end of the year (31st December 2019). The form will be available on the Council's website under 'Documents | Others' or email to request one be sent back to you.

 If you are an Euxton resident and you are already on the Chorley Council allotment waiting list (prior to 1st June 2019) you will be contacted separately but, if you still want to fill in an expression of interest and answer the questions your name will be linked with that place.

 If you are an Euxton resident and not on any waiting lists and do not have a plot on another site in Chorley and wish to go on the Euxton waiting list - then you will need to get an 'Expression of Interest' form, fill and return it to Euxton Council before the end of the year (31st December 2019).

• If you are an Euxton resident and already have an allotment plot somewhere in Chorley, you will have been contacted by Chorley to ask if you may re-locate to a plot in Euxton. Euxton Council will have your details already, but if you want to fill out a form that is ok, you will be linked back.



Strimming and Hedgecutting

New equipment arrived at the end of June - thanks to a Chorley Neighbourhood Working group grant. The parish caretakers now have two new strimmer and hedge cutting machines to keep village areas tidy. Thanks Chorley Council.

The Euxton Caretakers, since getting the new strimming equipment, capitalised on the nice weather to clear public rights of way to make them easier for residents to walk.

Euxton Council is taking part in the Lancashire County Council 'Local Delivery Scheme 2019/20 Public Rights of Way' project where LCC pays the parish a grant to clear and maintain some of our paths.

Euxton has 45 public rights of way and these are all listed on our walking map which can you pick up for free from Euxton Library.



Euxton Gala Day

Saturday 6th July was this years Gala Day and the Parish Councillors attended in force to meet and chat with residents. By far the most popular colour of bag this year was purple!

Whilst at Gala, Chair Katrina Reed caught up with Robert Sage of the Euxton Gala Day Committee, which run the event every year, to view the lovely gazebo the committee bought with a grant from the parish council.





Appeal from Gala Day Committee An important Gala Day Banner was nowhere to be found this year, when members went to take it down. The banner is of a pennant design, yellow base with royal blue lettering "Gala Day" and was put on the railings by the houses down Bank Lane on Gala Day 6th July. They would very much like it to be returned as the maker will be unable to make another one to match the one they still have. It is 18 years since the banner was made, in 2001, to celebrate the 700th anniversary of Euxton being awarded the right to hold a market.

Planning Objections

In recent months the parish council submitted written objections to a number of larger planning applications, and here are some updates.

Dunrobin Drive - an application for 51 homes off the rear of Dunrobin Drive - Chorley granted planning permission in May.

Greenside - an application to build 24 homes on land, previously grass play space and a mini football pitch at Greenside, has currently stalled and may be withdrawn - this does not mean to say it has gone away it most likely will be re-presented in a different form or layout.

Fields off School Lane - an application for 180 homes was submitted and is going through the planning process. A similar application was rejected by Chorley Planning and subsequently dismissed at appeal in November 2017.

Councillor Philip Preston

Phil was co-opted to the Parish Council in June 2019.

Having lived in Croston and Eccleston for most my life, I subsequently moved to Euxton in 2014 with my family, and as such I have children attending Primary school in the Parish as well as High School, in Chorley.

In my professional life I am Quantity Surveyor and after having previously worked for United Utilities as well as other North West based companies for a number of years , I set my own Commercial Management Practice up in 2015.

The Practice is based in Buckshaw Village, and as such a I have strong passion for creating local employment opportunities, including provision of local apprenticeship opportunities.

Before being elected to the Council I had already proactively engaged in a number of areas and campaigns of local interest around sustainable development and local infrastructure, and I look forward to continuing this engagement as a new member of the Parish Council, as well as having the opportunity to work alongside other more experienced Councillors for the benefit of the Parish and its residents.

Both the maintaining and the creation of new green space for both leisure activity and recreation is key area of focus that I aim to continue support in capacity as a Parish C.ouncillor, as well as

hopefully getting involved in new areas of focus and support that are equally important to the residents of the Parish of whom I hope to engage with as many as possible during my term as a Councillor as we all look to best shape the Parish both for current residents and for future generations.

In terms of personal interest I enjoy caravanning and I also enjoy walking both in the surrounding hills, as well locally around the lanes of Euxton with my dog. I also enjoy playing golf which can often be best described as "a good walk spoiled".



Euxton Skate Park

Balshaw Villa Corner

Just by way of an update for residents on the land at the corner of Balshaw Lane and Wigan Road, behind the big hedge.

This land has been made into a public garden by the landowner and will be gifted to the Parish Council for the use of residents.

Presently this is in the legal process of being 'transferred' and when it is officially in the ownership of the Parish Council it will be opened for public use. Up until this transfer the land is still private and not open for the public to walk through.



Obstructions and pavements

A new project the All Purposes Committee is looking in to is how it can clear up our pavements of obstructions and make getting around the village easier for anyone including with sight impairment, in wheelchairs, pushing prams or just walking to school.

Some simple but effective ways YOU can help:

★ Think carefully when putting the bins out for collection push to the wall, tuck out of the way or on your drive if you can - take a look at how you have placed them and if they are an obstruction?

★ Do not park over dropped kerbs - these are for wheelchair or pushchair users to safely cross roads and side road - Don't be the obstruction to safe crossing.

 \star Do not park too far on a pavement that no one can pass on the pavement beside your vehicle.

★ If you see an obstruction of any nature, whether it is a sign, a post or anything - take a quick photo and email it and the location to clerk@euxtoncouncil.org.uk and we can report it and try to tidy up our pavements.



Detectors, testing and replacement



With the nights starting to draw in most of us think about turning on the heating. It starts with the odd evening before setting the timer clock for automatic warmth morning and night. It is also the time to examine your detectors. The recommendation is to change any primary batteries (Duracell etc.) every year. Vacuum the ports and holes of the detector to remove dust and debris.

If your house was built after 1992 it should be fitted with a smoke alarm with mains power. After the year 2000 it would also have a primary battery back-up. These smoke alarms should be also be changed after approximately 10 years.



Buckshaw Village WI are a busy group of women who meet at Euxton Cricket Club on the second Thursday of every month at 7.30.

You may require an electrician if you do not feel confident changing the smoke alarm yourself. There is nothing to compel you to change the smoke alarm or have an operating alarm, however, if you should sell your house the survey should indicate that the building does not comply with the Building Regulations. More importantly without an operating smoke alarm, you are placing yourself and family at significant risk.

If you have previously received a Home Fire Safety Check from Lancashire Fire & Rescue Service and the smoke alarm has stopped working, contact Sprue on 0800 141 2561, from Monday to Friday between 9am and 5pm, and they will arrange for a replacement smoke alarm to be delivered.

Anyone who would like a Home Fire Safety check can contact Lancashire FRS on 0800 169 1125. If you have a hearing impairment and wish to contact the Lancashire FRS Contact Centre, you can TEXT 07766 831145.

Another detector that you may not be familiar with is the carbon monoxide detector. If you have a solid fuel fire (coal or logs) or other flame-based appliances (gas fires, hobs or ovens) then there is the possibility of carbon monoxide. If the flame burns 'orange' on gas appliances, then it is burning inefficiently, and carbon monoxide will be produced. When you light a gas

hob there is always the 'orange' flame as it settles to the 'blue' flame of efficient combustion. Fires of all descriptions will have a flue to extract the carbon monoxide, but it requires the chimney sweeping and gas fires servicing to keep ventilation in order. The precision of parts in gas appliances may be compromised when they become older and worn so a carbon monoxide detector is a sensible purchase.

Cadent operate the gas supply pipes in our area. They also respond if you can smell gas or suspect that there is carbon monoxide. If you can smell gas or suspect carbon monoxide open doors and windows. If you small gas, then turn off the supply at the meter (NOT IF IT IS IN THE BASEMENT). Do not operate switches or naked flames if you small gas. If you suspect carbon monoxide move outside. Call Cadent emergency line on 0800 111 999.
